Rhonda and I departed from Seven Hills at 7:15 to meet up with the Budd's and Harris's at Richmond air base at 8:00am then continue on to the Zig Zag railway to meet Bruce at 9:am.

When passing through Rouse Hill Bruce called and requested for us to go via his house as he had left his medication at home. So after a detour and several phone calls we finally met up with the others at MacDonald's in Richmond. After Coffee and breakfast we continued to the Zig Zag railway and aired down.

The next stop was at the Glow Worm tunnel where we decided to complete the walk after deciding the rain would hold off.
